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A MONTH OF SORROW

The month of November has been, sadly, a very busy month for the Trust.

The much publicized Nia Glassie trial has featured prominently in the media and, as the details surrounding the beautiful 3 year old life and death were released, the nation went into an uproar.

Her untimely death, along with a string of recent high profile child killings . James Whakaruru, the Kahui twins, Delcelia Witikia, Lillybing, Coral-Ellen Burrows . has called New Zealands attention once again to the problem of child abuse in our country.

As awful as it is that it has taken the tragic death of one of our young children to get us to wake up, once again, to the problem of child abuse in our country, it has provided the trust with an opportunity to play an active part in the nationwide conversation.

This resurgence in national interest saw the trust invited to contribute to national television and radio discussions, as well as print.

John Sax, Chairman of the board, was invited to talk on Breakfast about the problem of child abuse in our country and the need for social policies that would encourage the safest environments for raising our children.

This was followed by a lively debate on Radio NZ¢ afternoon panel and an article in Muriel Newman¢ NZCPR Weekly Newsletter.

Fatherhood left wanting...



New Zealandos media continues to expose the crisis faced by our beloved children: abused by their parents, bullied in schools, ensnared by the influence of gangs and ultimately wreaking havoc on our communities through crime and violence. With such a high profile, ideas on the appropriate response have been widespread. For the Sake of Our Children Trustqhopes to turn the focus toward prevention. In essence, we are talking about leading people away from the cliff rather than the ±ambulance-at-the-bottomq approach.

Prevention starts with the family. Endless studies show that virtually every major social pathology we face can be linked back to the breakdown of the family: violent crime, drugs and alcohol abuse, truancy, unwed pregnancy, suicide, psychological disorders.q(See Dr. Muriel Newman, %Restoring Fatherhood+ www.nzcpr.com)

Newman goes on to describe how Andrew Becroft, New Zealands principal

Youth Court Judge, portrayed the deep-seated need boys have for a father figure: %4, 15, and 16 year-old boys seek out role models like heat seeking missilesq Itos either the leader of the Mongrel Mob or itos a sports coach or itos Dad. But an overwhelming majority of boys who I see in the Youth Court have lost contact with their father. õ What logn saying is that lon dealing in the Youth Court with boys for whom their Dad is simply not there, never has been. Gone, vanished and disappeared.+Indeed, his recent report that over 35,000 kids are currently living on the streets further evidences the social tragedy faced by New Zealand.

Despite this fundamental need for families to be founded on a strong motherfather unit, many Government policies and various social movements have pushed for the exact opposite. Welfare laws, antismacking legislation, civil unions and the like imply that the Government is a better £aregiverqthan a childs own parents.

We have been active in our campaign to empower New Zealands parents once again. It was such a delight to support the collection of more than 390,000 signatures for the last smacking referendum and we wait with baited breath to see whether it will be implemented in the upcoming election.

What can you do?

At the individual level, be the instruments of change. Catherine Lawson, Jigsaw Professional Consultant, stated that every New Zealander is responsible for keeping our children safe and alive. (See: % our Voice can save a childos life,
